

Student Device Code of Conduct

From the Round Top-Carmine ISD Student Code of Conduct:

Misuse of Technology Resources and the Internet

Students shall not:

- Violate policies, rules, or agreements signed by the student or the student's parent regarding the use of technology resources.
- Attempt to access or circumvent passwords or other security-related information of the district, students, or employees or upload or create computer viruses, including off school property if the conduct causes a substantial disruption to the educational environment.
- Attempt to alter, destroy, or disable district technology resources including but not limited to computers and related equipment, district data, the data of others, or other networks connected to the district's system, including off school property if the conduct causes a substantial disruption to the educational environment.
- Use the Internet or other electronic communications to threaten district students, employees, or volunteers, including off school property if the conduct causes a substantial disruption to the educational environment.
- Send, post, or possess electronic messages that are abusive, obscene, sexually oriented, threatening, harassing, damaging to another's reputation, or illegal, including cyberbullying and "sexting," either on or off school property, if the conduct causes a substantial disruption to the educational environment.
- Use e-mail or Web sites to engage in or encourage illegal behavior or threaten school safety, including off school property if the conduct causes a substantial disruption to the educational environment.

If a student violates this portion of the Student Pledge or Student Code of Conduct, these are the suggested consequences.

- Conference with Student
- Communication with Parent
- Moderated use of Chromebook (ie: block messages to group or Edmodo)
- Discipline Referral to Office -Violation of Established Rules and/or Procedures

While certain offenses may warrant the removal of a student from using a Chromebook/Tablet, more traditional forms of discipline (ie: detention, ISS) would serve as well. The Chromebook/Tablet is as necessary for student learning as a textbook and should remain in place if possible.
